Subject Challenge

Science – GET YOUR PARENTS TO HELP YOU!

Science is going to be one of your favourite subjects when you join us in year 7, I just know it! That's because in science we learn lots of things about the world. Everything from what makes up living things, to the planets in our solar system.

Now, when you are in a science lesson within our school you are scientists. Scientists like to see how they can make the impossible possible!

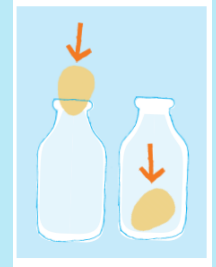
Do you think you could get an uncooked egg into a glass bottle? Today, you're going to see if you can.

The brief:

Make an egg fit into a bottle without breaking it

What you'll need:

1. An uncooked egg
2. A pan of boiling water (**with adult supervision**)
3. A glass of vinegar
4. A milk bottle



What you need to do:

1. Submerge an egg into a glass of vinegar for two days. The egg should be very rubbery – you should be able to squash it.
2. Heat the bottle in hot water – remember to use gloves or a tea towel when handling it.
3. Take the bottle out of the hot water, and rest the egg on the neck of the bottle.

Tip:

Try lubricating the egg in cooking oil or washing up liquid to make it slippery.

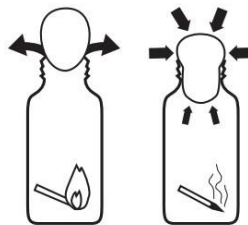

When the inside of the bottle is hot, there is a higher **pressure** inside than outside. So air inside the bottle pushes the egg out.



When inside the bottle cools, there is a higher **pressure** outside than inside. So air outside the bottle pushes the egg inside.
